Dear Friends.

It has been a real joy to get the opportunities to meet so many people at the various events that go on in our Parish Hall each week and through the month. The fortnightly community Soup and Cheese lunch is going from strength to strength as more and more people come to enjoy fellowship and delicious food. The bowls, the Ladies Fellowship and Teen Blast are also doing a wonderful job in building community and connecting people with the Gospel in very real and tangible ways.

I have also had the opportunity to meet my local colleagues in ministry, Rev Richard Kerr of the Presbyterian Church and Rev Rosalind Taggart of the Non-Subscribing Presbyterian Church and we are looking forward to creating opportunities to work and to worship together.

PARISH FINANCES

No 1 account (day to day income and expenditure)

At time of writing, this account is overdrawn by £2,694. Recovery of around £10,000 gift aid tax refund in early March will reduce the overdraft in this account. This should leave a net surplus in these two accounts.

No 2 Account (Fabric fund) - for upkeep and repair of property and buildings

Through recent fund raising, monthly envelopes and family donations, this account has, at time of writing a surplus of £6,187. In the last financial year, £17,000 from this account was used in updating the bathrooms and kitchen in the vicarage and on purchasing a parish computer/printer and software. It is proving very useful, in meeting costs incurred with the upkeep of the church estate. The Select Vestry would encourage parishioners to continue to contribute to this account through monthly envelopes, donations and by support for fund raising events.

Financial details of both accounts for year ending 31st December 2013 will be circulated to parishioners, after they have been approved by the Select Vestry in March.

- 1. Thanks again to the choir cum organist. When I moved "camp" to a certain parish in Belfast, there were only 5 ladies in the choir. We could not even mange any of the canticles. Very sad to see it was.
- 2. The churchwardens in the Parish were very helpful, aided by Alan & Brian in Templepatrick, and Pat, Heather and Margaret in Donegore 3 wise women.
- 3. I date myself in referring to the old BBC TV programme "Victorian Melodrama" i.e. a reliving of 19th century concerts. Lionel Sachs was the M.C and at the end of thanking all the artists and musicians he referred to "Yours Truly" i.e. the audience in Victorian Dress. So the part of the congregation was and is important. Here 2 points stand out:
 - i. Audience participation
 - ii. Audience reaction

Both were very high in your 2 churches.

A friend of mine is a cartoonist. He has one cartoon re taking a service. The congregation men were mute silent. So the priest turns around and says loudly "For God's Son, will you say something even if it is only AMEN" !! N.B. Amen is the people's part of the prayer – not the priest's.

A wonderful unexpected gift, which reflects why I rated audience participation and reaction in your parish as very high.

The E100 Bible Reading Programme

We all know so many bible stories, we have heard them since childhood and we have grown up to have favourites – or ones that have particular significance or relevance for us. Each Sunday as passages from the Old Testament, the Epistles and the Gospels are read, and even as the children's story is told – we are transported in our mind's eye to familiar but ancient, distant places, into the presence of people we know so well but whom we have never met and hear the unfolding of events that we almost imagine we ourselves witnessed. Yet we all acknowledge that there also many times when we hear stories we don't know, or listen to passages whose meaning we struggle to understand for our own lives.

The E100 is a program of 100 "essential Bible readings" that takes us on a journey from Genesis to Revelation. They are chosen to present the full story of God's plan of salvation for us, the people he has created and whom he loves. It gives us the opportunity to take a fresh look at some of those familiar stories and to connect them with the stories that precede and succeed them in the flow of that full story. It is also an opportunity to notice things we have missed in the past and to ask questions we have never before had the chance to ask. In the Wednesday Evening Group we are using the E100 as the basis for our bible study and everyone is welcome to come, listen, ask questions and share thoughts and opinions.

The E100 readings are published weekly in the Pew News, and are also available on the parish website, but there is also a companion book published by Scripture Union called Essential 100 by Whitney T Kuniholm which can be ordered on-line from scripture union or from any Christian book shop.

E100 is advertised as 'Your journey through the bible in 100 readings'. It's a journey that no matter how many times you have made it before, it always yields something new and always deepens and broadens our understanding of God's place in and for our lives.

Saints of the Church

Patrick, Patron Saint of Ireland 17 March -- Missionary -- Festival -- White

Patrick was born in Celtic Cornwall around the year 390 and was captured by Irish raiders when he was sixteen years old and taken to Ireland as a slave. After six years, he escaped and seems to have gone to the Continent. He eventually found his way back to his own family, where his previously nominal Christian faith grew and matured. He returned to Gaul and was there trained as a priest and much influenced by the form of monasticism evolving under Martin of Tours. When he was in his early forties, he returned to Ireland as a bishop, and made his base at Armagh, which became the centre of his See. He evangelised the people of the land by walking all over the island, gently bringing men and women to a knowledge of Christ. Although he faced fierce opposition and possible persecution, he continued his missionary journeys. Despite being unsuccessful in his attempts to establish the diocesan system he had experienced in Gaul, his monastic foundations proved to be the infrastructure required to maintain the faith after his death, which occurred on this day in the year 460.

Joseph of Nazareth 19 March -- Festival -- White

In the gospel of Matthew, Joseph is depicted as a good man, a working carpenter, who trusted in God. He received God's messenger who shared with him God's will for him and for Mary, to whom he was engaged to be married. Luke's gospel describes how Joseph took the new-born child as if he were his own. He was with Mary when, on the fortieth day after the birth, Jesus was presented in the Temple, 'where every first-born male is designated as holy to the Lord'. The adoption of Jesus by Joseph also established Jesus in the descent of David, to accord with the prophecy that Israel's deliverer would be of the House and lineage of David.

The Annunciation of our Lord to the Blessèd Virgin Mary 25 March -- Principal Feast -- White or Gold

The story of the announcement of the coming of God made flesh in the person of his Son, Jesus the Christ, the Anointed One, is heard in today's proclamation of the good news from the gospel of Luke. The feast marks the conception of Christ in the womb of Mary and has been celebrated in the Church at least since the late fourth century. The perfect humanity and the complete divinity of Jesus is affirmed, following the controversies around those orthodox assertions, which themselves led to the acknowledgement of Mary as Theotokos, God-bearer, which in the West became translated as Mother of God. The celebration thus took on strong associations with the person of Mary, and became known in England as Lady Day. In recent years, the Church has re-affirmed the day as a Feast of our Lord, on which his virgin- mother has a unique place of honour and veneration.

Mark the Evangelist 25 April -- Festival -- Evangelist -- Red

John Mark was a Jew and, according to Paul's letter to the Colossians, was cousin to Barnabas. He accompanied Barnabas and Paul on their first missionary journey. Afterwards, he went to Cyprus with Barnabas and to Rome with first Paul and then Peter. Mark's gospel is generally regarded as the earliest and was most likely written whilst he was in Rome. It was probably based as much on Peter's preaching of the good news as on Mark's own memory. Mark's gospel has a sharpness and an immediacy about it and he does not spare the apostles in noting their weaknesses and lack of understanding that Jesus the Christ would suffer for the world's redemption. Sharing in the glory of the resurrection means sharing in the giving of self, both in body and spirit, even to death; sharing the gospel was, for all, in essence both excessively generous and ultimately sacrificial.

Philip & James, Apostles 1 May -- Festival -- Apostles -- Red

Philip and James appear in the list of the twelve apostles in the first three gospels but are frequently confused with other early saints who share their names. In John's gospel, Philip has a more prominent rôle, being the third of the apostles to be called by Jesus and then himself bringing his friend Nathanael to the Lord. Philip is the spokesman for the other apostles who are questioning the capacity for feeding the five thousand and, at the Last Supper, enters into a sort of dialogue with Jesus which leads to the Farewell Discourses of our Lord.

James is said to be the son of Alphæus and is often known as 'James the Less' to distinguish him. He may also be the 'James the Younger' who, in Mark's gospel, is a witness at the Crucifixion.

They are celebrated on the same day because the church in Rome, where their relics rest, was dedicated on this day in the year 560.

Comgall of Bangor, abbot. Down diocese. 602 May 10

Comgall was the founder and first abbot of Bangor Abbey, said to have been the largest monastery in Ireland, with as many as three thousand in the community at one period. Comgall visited Columba in Iona and worked closely with him in spreading the Gospel. Columbanus was trained at Bangor before setting out on his missionary journeys to Europe. There was a strong family-spirit in the community life at Bangor. Counselling, as well as instruction, was an important part of the training. To Comgall is attributed the saying, "A man without a soul-friend is a body without a head."

Matthias the Apostle 14 May -- Festival -- Apostle -- Red

After the betrayal of Jesus by Judas Iscariot, the apostles brought their number back to twelve by choosing Matthias to replace him. He was chosen by lot from amongst the disciples. The author of the Acts of the Apostles sees apostleship differently from Paul's interpretation of the rôle and seems to reflect the understanding of the gospel of Luke. The number had to be restored so that they might "sit on thrones judging the twelve tribes of Israel". It was conditional that they had to have been with Jesus during his earthly ministry and witnesses to the resurrection. The point of being chosen by lot, rather than by some democratic method, indicated the election or choosing by God, rather than by mortals.

The Visit of the Blessèd Virgin Mary to Elizabeth 31 May -- Festival -- of the BVM -- White

The church today recalls the visit of Elizabeth to her cousin Mary, as recorded in Luke's gospel. The celebration of the feast first occurred at a Franciscan Order General Chapter in 1263 but quickly spread throughout Europe. Since it is a celebration clearly described in the gospel, the churches of the Reformation were less inclined to proscribe it as they were other Marian feasts, particularly as it was the occasion for Mary to sing her great hymn of praise in honour of her Lord and God. Just as Luke sees John the Baptist as the last of the prophets of the old covenant, he uses John's leaping in Elizabeth's womb as the first time John bears witness to Christ as the promised Messiah. Thereby he links the old covenant with the new. He seems to be saying that just as the old covenant clearly points to Jesus, so does its last prophet, yet to be born.
